Dr. Whitt called the meeting to order. The minutes from the October 3 meeting were approved with correction noted.

New Federal Regulations for satisfactory Academic Progress

Cari Wickliffe and Shawn McCown outlined the new federal regulations for satisfactory academic progress that go into effect July 1, 2013 and how these changes will affect students. New federal regulations want documentation on student's progress towards graduation as well as complete 67% of 150% of programmed courses taken. Students will be required to demonstrate completion of their degree program. University students must meet SAP requirements to receive his/her merit and or need based institutional aid. A student who falls below a 2.0 GPA receives a warning status for that semester. Federal aid is available to a student during the warning semester. Students who do not meet SAP requirements are given one semester to improve their status or are no longer eligible for aid. If a student fails to improve his/her grade point average, he/she may appeal. The student is responsible for filling out an appeal form which must contain form #15 and have it signed by his/her academic advisor. If the student's appeal is denied, no federal aid will be granted that semester. However, if the appeal is granted, the student will be eligible to receive federal aid.

Transfer students are also affected by the new regulations. If a student fails a class, he may use federal funds to pay for retaking the class. If a student receives grades at 67% and decides to retake the course, federal funds cannot be used. If a student is failing, regardless of his/her classification, then federal funds can be used to take the course.

Backdated withdrawals are not permitted for financial aid purposes. Refund amounts will be based on the last day the student attended class.

Students do receive notifications of their status via emails or letters. Institutional scholarships do not affect federal aid dollars.

Update on Undergraduate Academic Policy Review

Jay Haugen presented an update on Academic Policy Review. If a student graduates and wants to return for a second major or minor, the committee found that larger institutions do not allow their students to return for another major or minor. However, smaller institutions have no issue with their students returning to Saint Louis University and allow students to return for a degree if they find it is not available at their student's previous institution.

Jay asked further questions on how to handle students who are dissatisfied from a particular program not from the university. He is not comfortable with making intra-university transfers.

Updates:

- a. Minor in HPE—Dr. White stated the UAAC faculty committee had a meeting. For more information on the program proposal, Dr. White will be addressing the committee at the November 14 UAAC meeting.
- b. GIS Certificate—Drs. Wajamu and Danner will present this November 14 UAAC faculty meeting. Any questions concerning the proposed certificate, Geographical Information Systems.
- c. University Level Student Learning Outcomes—Dr. Whitt and the SLO committee held their final forum in October for the purpose of the committee is revising the draft based on feedback received. The final draft will be presented to GAO for approval and to the REGCC. More information will be forthcoming.
- d. SGA—Rigby informed the committee that SGA has voted to postpone the fiscal year administration.
