

UAAC Faculty Committee
February 13, 2013 Meeting Minutes

Dr. Whitt called the meeting to order. The December 12, 2012 meeting minutes were approved with one correction or two.

Updates:

- Dr. Colignon asked if the members of the Board of Trustees approved changing the name of the program from Honors in Communication to the faculty name of Communication Studies. Dr. Whitt confirmed that the name change had been made and the faculty name was changed to Professor Dr. Dr. Whitt also stated going forward all changes like this need to come to UAAC and AAC respectively.

Proposed Changes in Core Curriculum: Recommendations for the Undergraduate Program

- Dr. Boyd stated the SACS 2010 Core Competencies self-assessment showed the need for revisions in the areas of critical thinking abilities, communication skills, and technology, questions of diversity, greater emphasis upon interdisciplinary courses
- The committee looked at the practicalities of writing a core course curriculum and how to fit these practices into a 10 week session instead of the usual 16 week session.
 - A writing component would be added to it.
 - PHIL 111, 112, 113
 - PHIL 115
 - THEO 101
 - HIST 111, 112, or 332
- Best practices for the use of technology resulted in the recommendation of:
 - Adding CSTD 115 *Concepts and Applications of Technology in the Classroom*
- The question of requiring a “diversity” course was addressed.
 - Having the student choose between taking “Cultures in Disunity in US” or “Global Citizenship”
 - Postpone diversity component until 100 level
 - Have the students take a capstone course
 - Take one course in the major/minor field, or English 110, COMM 305, or OSTD 320, or another approved course
- Students will be required to take one course in quantitative reasoning and natural science and will be able to choose from a list of courses from either area.
- Social Science requirements would be reduced from 9 credit hours to 6 credit hours

These goals will be accomplished by:

- ✓ Including writing composition in literature and humanities courses
 - ✓ Teach students how to write arguments
 - ✓ Students will be permitted to choose from PHIL 105 or PHIL 110
 - ✓ A student's writing ability will be demonstrated in the writing portfolio
is used by most faculty and the committee
- The Natural Sciences require items 3 through 5 before a student can graduate
course

Dr. Rule made a motion to endorse the curriculum changes. Dr. Tyuse seconded the motion. The subcommittee unanimously passed the changes.

Fr. Ted Vitali, Chairman of the Department of Philosophy, addressed the committee concerning why, in some programs students are given the option of taking PHIL 105 and, in other different programs, PHIL 110. Fr. Vitali stated that it often occurs as a result of the nature of the program because of accreditation requirements only want 6 credit hours in the liberal arts. PHIL 105 is an introduction into the Western and Eastern foundations of Western Civilization. This course would be developed but included both PHIL 105 and PHIL 205. Fr. Vitali said that it is availability, but it would only be opened to students enrolled in engineering, business, and nursing. Dr. Tyuse stated that it is not a barrier in the professional programs, engineering, business, and nursing. Dr. Rule said that students have to take either PHIL 105 or PHIL 110 because engineering has its own ethics course.

Fr. Ted stated he is teaching for the third course, in philosophy, which will be the substitution, but due to the expense of tuition it would be best if he were to teach it in place with the substitute teacher. Fr. Vitali taught this class at St. Paul. The department hopes students to take philosophy course during the summer.

The committee thanked Fr. Vitali for his time in helping them understand why some students are allowed to waive PHIL 105.
